2013 Asian championships, Japan

What an extraordinary experience I have been granted, participating in the 2013 Asian Championship held in Hayama, Japan, located two hours South East of Tokyo. I enjoyed travelling to a foreign country and experiencing a completely different culture and its' traditions.

Racing alongside some of the best Optimist sailors in the world was an experience that I will never forget. Myself, Hugo Llewelyn from Victoria and 5 other Australian team members travelled to Japan to compete against 105 other people from around the world. Our team arrived in Japan two days prior to the commencement of the Championship so that we would have time to settle in and train with our coach Rob Brewer. The first two days of training proved challenging due to light winds and being exposed to the Pacific Ocean meant relentless large swell. Even more challenging was adapting to the extreme heat and humidity, however the team managed to deal with these elements really well.

After an amazing open ceremony the Championships were off to a flying start but screeched to a halt after 2 days of racing were abandoned due to a thick cloud cover which drowned out the little wind present. The scheduled lay day was now used for team's racing where we saw the clouds clear to reveal Mount Fuji. The Australian team sailed extremely well in the teams racing, beating America by the skin of our teeth but unfortunately we were disqualified by the measurement boat due to an equipment mismatch.



The sea breeze pattern began to kick in now offering around 7-10 knots each day. As fleet racing came around I got to experience the Singapore team in action, including the European and World champion. It was really interesting observing their different ways of sailing and how disciplined they are. I have certainly come away from this regatta a better sailor. With prevailing sea breezes my results were consistent even though the conditions were not ideal for me. The Singapore and Thailand teams performed very well filling the top 15 places. To get anywhere near the top ten bunch you had to sail every aspect of the race perfectly, just one small mistake can land you in the late forties as I learnt the hard way.

The last race would have been my highlight of the regatta with the wind reaching 15-17 knots and a big ocean swell. My coach and I powered up my boat as much as possible putting the mast rake at a ridiculous setting. I set sail in my last ever race in an Optimist. After a good race I had my best result of the regatta, and I was pleased to be finishing Opti's on a positive note.

The closing ceremony was one to remember, attended by a Japanese Princess and many other Japanese dignitaries who all addressed the audience. Not only have I had the opportunity to participate in a demanding regatta I also had so much fun along the way and met many sailors who I hope to see again in the future. I have many people to thank, Rob Brewer who supported me during the regatta, Almuth Lorenz who was a sensational team leader, my coach David White for helping me prepare in the months before the Championship, and the Mornington Yacht Club for their fundraising efforts and support.

A big thankyou to Japan for being so hospitable and organising such a fantastic event, and last but not least Mum and Dad.
